Bill Stone's Reflections

The heavens declare the glory of the Creator; the firmament proclaims the handiwork of Love. Day to day speech pours forth and night to night knowledge is revealed. There is no speech, nor are there words; their voice is not heard; Yet does their music go out through all the earth, and their words to the end of the world. (From Psalm 19, interpreted by Nan Merrill)

Many people talk about finding God in creation. Some even refer to weekend walks in the forest as their "church." *Psalm* 19 echoes this same sentiment. With beauty beyond words, creation bears witness to the one who breathed it into being, and at this time of year in New Vernon, it's easy to see why. Walking around Loantaka and Jockey Hollow, or even the short stretch from the manse to the Church, I am continually struck by the beauty of this place.

The Scottish naturalist John Muir, who spent his life exploring some of the most breathtaking parts of our country, once said that it's a good idea every once in a while to spend time in more mundane settings. He even recommended seeking out shadows and darkness. This, he said, helps us to learn more about these less appreciated places and, further, to appreciate the beauty of home even more upon our return.

This is good advice, not just for nature lovers but for Christians as well. We all know from experience that on our journey of faith it is impossible to remain on the mountaintop. Life is not always simple and straightforward, and our faith reflects that. But when we find ourselves in the shadows—especially the shadows of doubt and grief—there is an opportunity to grow deeper in our relationship with God. Acknowledging and naming these difficult times can help us begin to discover that God is just as present in these moments. And when we begin to notice God at work in the shadows, we also see our mountaintops in a new light.

Autumn is a season of beauty, but it is also a season of change. This makes it a good time to reflect on the theme of our stewardship campaign, "Ushering In a New Generation." A few weeks ago as our campaign began, we reflected on the history of our church family. Over the last 180 years there have been moments of great joy and also moments of hardship that, looking back, demonstrate both the perseverance and great faith of those who have gone before us.

And so as we look back and acknowledge that work with gratitude and thanksgiving, we also look forward in anticipation and excitement for what the new generation can bring. We are all invited to reflect on how we might contribute to the ministry of this church—through our time, through our talents, and through our treasure. And as we do, we're confident that God goes with us, and that God will continue to be with us in both the high and low places, guiding us just as he has those who have gone before. *Continued next page...*

COMMITTEE HIGHLIGHTS

Adult Education (Julia Buteux):

- Doug Simon, emeritus professor of political science at Drew, spoke on Sep. 25. 38 people attended.
- Catherine Morrisett & Nunzio Gubitosa of Grace Counseling in Madison spoke on Oct. 16. 21 attended.
- Dr. J. Perry Leavell will be speaking about the 2016 presidential election results on November 13.

Youth Education (Kerra French):

- Hunger Walk was held on Sunday. Kerra and Jeff walked with Bill Stone.
- Planning a Friday fellowship dinner with families.
- Bill Stone will meet with the Church's youth—may schedule for Fridays at 4 pm.

Congregational Life (Meg Richardson):

- A luncheon was held after church on Sunday, October 2 to welcome Bill Stone on his first day. Approximately 85 people attended the luncheon. \$230 free-will collection taken will help offset the cost.
- A reception is planned for Sunday, November 13th following the Installation Service.
- The congregational Christmas Luncheon will be held on Sunday, Dec. 11th immediately following worship.

Finance (Keith Wood):

- \$10,000 deficit in September. Year over year we are up \$45,000 on the bottom line due to a bequest and up \$9000 vs. budget. Revenues are up and expenses are down.
- We have been recommended for a grant of \$150,000 by the NJ Historic Trust. These funds will be made available to us in early 2017. This grant is for the Roofs and Tower Project recently completed. The funds will cover completed work and ongoing work.

Stewardship (Todd Claytor):

- October 9th was Stewardship Sunday.
- Pledges coming in now and on track. Goal is \$405,000. \$120,000 pledged so far with 37 pledges.
- Second mailing going out with pledge cards the 2nd or 3rd week of Nov. to those who have not pledged.

Membership (Jane O'Keeffe):

- Committee met to discuss the contacts they have made with families on our membership list. Progress is being made, but there is still work to be done.
- Reviewed directory to identify members' adult children to see if they wish to be active in the Church.
- Member name tags and the membership packet have been updated.

Mission & Outreach (Jonathan Shelby): Mental Health dinner scheduled for Tues., Oct. 25 in Chorba Hall.

Nominating (Tom MacCowatt): Met to discuss 2017 openings. Slate to be presented at the Nov/Dec meeting.

Personnel (Carol Vellekamp): Personnel evaluation reports are going out soon.

Worship and Music (Peter Saulnier): Choir Director Search is ongoing with several candidate interviews. Clerk's Report:

- Anne-Marie Christensen wants to be married here, with their minister & Bill Stone sharing the officiating.
- The Membership Committee will develop a welcome banner for Bill Stone.

Pastor's report:

- Bill Stone expressed deep gratitude to everyone for the extremely warm welcome he and his family received.
- Bill has focused his time on getting to know Church members and community in his first few weeks here.
- On Sunday Bill joined Jeff and Kerra French for the Youth Group's walk in support of the Soup Kitchen.
- On October 1st, Bill officiated at the wedding of Lisa Dilenno and Gary Baumann at the Madison Hotel.
- Bill will be participating in the wedding of Katherine Newburg and her fiancé Michael Stieh this weekend.
- Bill will now be focusing on the care and concern list.

The next meeting of Session will be Tuesday, November 15th at 7:00 pm. Vellekamp will provide refreshments, Buteux will lead devotions and Wood is responsible for usher recruitment in November. 


