Dear Friends,

John D. Caputo is an American philosopher who is the Professor of Religion Emeritus at Syracuse University and Professor of Philosophy Emeritus at Villanova University. In his book, On Religion, he says "the religious sense of life awakens when we lose our bearings and let go, when we find ourselves brought up against something that exceeds our powers, that overpowers us and knocks us off our hinges, something impossible vis-à-vis our limited potencies."

"The religious sense of life kicks in when we are solicited by the voices of the impossible, by the possibility of the impossible, provoked by an unforeseeable and absolute future. Here is a realm where things do not bend to knowledge or our will and we are not calling the shots. We are out of our element. This is God's element, not ours, the element of the impossible, God's realm, or 'Kingdom,' where God rules...Love and hope and faith are the virtues of the impossible, taking the measure of the immeasurable future...The religious sense of life has to do with exposing oneself to the radical uncertainty and the open-endedness of life, with what we are calling the absolute future, which is meaning-giving, salt-giving, risk-taking...Our hearts are restless, astir with the possibility of renewal and rebirth."

"Religion is for lovers," he says. "It's for men and women of passion, for real people with a passion for something, who hope like mad in something, who love something with a love that surpasses understanding."

This summer, your Pastor Nominating Committee will be forming and beginning the process of searching for a new pastor. They will first need to complete a ten-page Mission Information Form that gives a picture of our congregation (size, neighborhood, ethnic composition, average worship attendance, current programs, and so forth). It then asks for essay answers to such questions as:

- What is the congregation's or organization's vision for ministry?
- How do you feel called to reach out to address the emerging needs of your community or constituency?
- How will this position help you to reach your vision and mission goals?

The form will also ask the Church to:

• Provide a description of the characteristics needed by the person who is open to being called to this congregation.

• Provide a list of specific tasks, assignments, and program areas for which this person have responsibility.

How does a church put on a form its own identity as "real people with a passion for something, who hope like mad in something, who love something with a love that surpasses understanding?" and their wish for a pastor with some of these same attributes? I offer these answers:

- 1) It is important that the Mission Information Form convey this passion and hope through language and content.
- 2) There will be times of "uncertainty and the open-endedness" in this process.
- 3) However, the committee of real people in conversation with pastors seeking a call will embody that passion and hope.

And with all things in this process, we can trust that, "We are out of our element. This is God's element, not ours."

The following highlights are from the May 19, 2015 Session Meeting. The meeting began with Kathy Sheeleigh leading devotions.

Committee Highlights

Youth Education: Confirmation Sunday is May 31, 2015. The second Adult Fellowship Dinner was hosted on May 15. Six women were in attendance. Jeff French cooked with the help of Todd Claytor and Robert Gamble. The youth will wash your car on Sunday, June 6. High School Graduate Sunday is June 7. Cemetery: A plaque was attached to a crematorium plot in the Memorial Garden. The cemetery grounds are neatly landscaped, and maintenance is ongoing. On the Friday before Memorial Day, the Girl Scouts will put flags on Veterans' graves. In July, the back wall of the Memorial Garden will be repaired. Two cemetery plots are currently available. Congregational Life: The Annual Church Picnic will be held on June 14 at the Ewigs' home from 4 to 7. Please remember to sign up to bring a side dish or dessert.

Finance: The lease on CME space has been drawn and is awaiting comments. The budgetary breakdown of Phase One of the Capital Campaign was presented.

Administration/Communication: Caroline demonstrated the ease and accessibility of the Church website. Information should be sent to Debbie in order for her to keep it up to date.

Buildings & Grounds: Stabilizing the sanctuary is the most pressing project right now. The Finance Committee is currently preparing a plan to replace the bathroom and the Deacons' kitchenette in the basement. The contract for our prospective basement tenants in Fellowship Hall is almost completed; expected occupancy is on June 1. The area must be cleaned out before that date. Whatever is unclaimed or unwanted will be put in the dumpster that will be in the parking lot as of May 27.

Pastor's Report: There will be a breakfast at 9 am on May 31 for the Confirmands, their mentors, and Session members. The members of the confirmation class are: J.D. Grant, Lauren Shelby, and Peter Travers.

Dr. Gamble will be at Princeton Seminary June 10-12.

Dr. Gamble and Yulia will be taking EMT training over the summer. The classes will be held on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Saturdays.

There will be a meeting on June 23 for multiple committees. Dinner will be at 6 pm with meetings to follow at 7. Kathy Sheeleigh offered to supply the food.

On Sunday, May 24, in lieu of a traditional sermon, Robert asked for different people to speak about how God was at work in their lives at particular moments.

Communion will be served on Sunday, June 7, 2015.

The next meeting of Session will be on Tuesday, June 16 at 7 pm.




June Selection: The Secret Life of Bletchly Park: The WWII Codebreaking Centre and the Men and Women Who Worked There, by Sinclair McKay

This country house in the Buckinghamshire countryside was home to Britain's most brilliant mathematical brains and the scene of immense advances in technology—indeed, the birth of modern computing. The military codes deciphered there were instrumental in turning both the Battle of the Atlantic and the war in North Africa.

McKay's book is the first history for the general reader of life at Bletchley Park, and an amazing compendium of memories from people who were once its habitants—of skating on the frozen lake in the grounds, of the high jinks at nearby accommodation hostels—and of the implacable secrecy that meant girlfriend and boyfriend working in adjacent huts knew nothing about each other's work. - Amazon.com



- **Compassion:** Having the ability to suffer with others; being motivated by others' pain and is called into action as advocate; is motivated by caring for others while concurrently keeping the organizational goals clearly in focus.
 - Preaching and Worship Leadership: Is a consistently effective preacher and worship leader; is able to inspire from the pulpit; communicates a clear and consistent message through sermons that are carefully prepared and artfully delivered; projects the identity and character of the congregation through worship leadership presence.
 - **Lifelong Learner:** Individual who uses every experience in life as a potential tool for growth; one who pursues continuing education; and one who builds on strengths and seek assistance to improve weaknesses.

- Hopeful: Maintains stability in the moment and hope for the future; provides direction, guidance, and faith when describing basic needs; and helps followers to see a way through chaos and complexity.
- **Spiritual Maturity:** Shows strong personal depth and spiritual grounding; demonstrates integrity by walking the talk and by responding with faithfulness of purpose; is seen by others as trustworthy and authentic; nurtures a rich spiritual life; seeks the wisdom and guidance of appropriate mentors; is able to articulate a clear and consistent theology.
- Teacher: Creates learning environments where students are active participants as individuals and as members of collaborative groups; designs lesson plans that teach concepts, facts, and theology; effectively uses multiple learning tools to reach a wide variety of learners; revises instructional strategies based upon ministry/organization context.

COMMUNICATION

- **Communicator:** Advances the abilities of individuals and the organizations through active listening supported with meaningful oral and written presentation of information.
- Public Communicator: Demonstrates a comfortable ease when speaking in a variety of settings (both small and large groups); is effective at addressing a variety of topics; can get messages across with the desired effect.
- Technologically Savvy: The ability to navigate successfully the world of technology using software, blogging, multi-media, and websites as tools for ministry.

- **Bilingual:** Having the ability to use two languages, especially with equal or nearly equal fluency; able to use multiple languages in communication.
- Media Communicator: Has experience developing materials for a variety of written or multimedia forms of communications (print, Internet-based, social media, etc.).

Enables others to acquire the tools and support they need to perform well and influences others toward a spirit of service and meaningful contributions to mission accomplishment.
- Initiative: Demonstrates ambition, is highly motivated; is action-oriented and full of energy for things seen as challenging; seizes opportunity; pushes self and others to achieve desired results.
 - **Bridge Builder:** Possesses responsibility for the unity of the congregation and/or organization; works to connect people of different cultures, worldviews, and theological positions.

- Self-Differentiation: Demonstrates strong and appropriate personal boundaries in relationships; has a healthy appreciation of self, without being egotistical; is emotionally mature; can maintain a calm presence in the midst of turmoil; is not overly dependent upon outside affirmation; works to build a strong personal support system.
- Personal Resilience: Learns from adversity and failure; picks up on the need to change personal, interpersonal, and leadership behaviors; deals well with ambiguity; copes effectively with change; can decide and act without having the total picture; comfortably handles risk and uncertainty; seeks feedback; expresses personal regret when appropriate.
- Flexibility: Adapts behavior and work methods in response to new information, changing conditions, unexpected obstacles, or ambiguity; remains open to new ideas and approaches; and works concurrently on related and conflicting priorities without losing focus or attention.
