Dear Friends,

The following article appeared in the *Houston Chronicle*: "Itzhak Perlman, the violinist, gave a concert at Avery Fisher Hall at Lincoln Center in New York. As he always does, Perlman, who was stricken with polio as a child, entered the stage wearing braces on his legs and walking with the aid of crutches, one step at a time, painfully and slowly. He reached his chair, sat down, put down his crutches, unclasped the braces on his legs, picked up his violin, and nodded to the conductor.

This is his ritual; only this time, something went wrong. A few bars into the symphony, a string on his violin broke. Like the shot of a pistol, the audience could hear it snap. The music stopped. The audience waited in anticipation of what would happen next. Would he re-string his violin or be given another? Instead he waited a moment, closed his eyes and signaled the conductor to begin again. The orchestra played from where they had left off.

Perlman played with passion and power and purity. He modulated, changing and re-composing the piece in his head. At one point it sounded like he was detuning the strings to get new sounds from them that they had never made before. When he was finished, there was an awesome silence. Then the audience rose and cheered. On their feet they screamed and cheered.

Perlman smiled, wiped his brow, raised his bow to quiet the crowd, and then said, not boastfully but in a quiet, pensive, reverent tone, 'You know, sometimes it is the artist's task to find out how much music you can still make with what you have left.'

As we enter Stewardship Season, I encourage you to think of yourself as an artist with the gifts God has given you. In this fast-changing, bewildering world, we are called to make music with all we have. Sometimes we are called upon to do more with less. And when life breaks down and disables us, as it often does, we are invited to create, adapt, and make music in ways we are still able. The older I get, the more I realize we all have our handicaps and limitations, but it is a beautiful thing to see someone transcend those in faithful acts of service or giving. There is a verse in Luke,

Give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap; for the measure you give will be the measure you receive.

The ministry of a church is like a symphony. Each of us has a part to play. What is your part? What can you give of your financial resources and your time and talents as an act of dedication and creativity to the harmony we make as a whole? Never underestimate the value of your contribution. By faith, what you give is given back to you, to our church, our community and our world by the grace, the power, and the passion of God.

The Middle East on the Edge of the Abyss

Sunday, NOVEMBER 15 ~ 11:30 am in the Library

The entire fabric of civil society in much of the Middle East lies in shreds as one country after another is consumed by anarchy and violent conflict. How far we have fallen from the hopeful early days of the Arab Spring only five years ago. All hopes for a better and more democratic future for the region seem to have been eclipsed by ever more horrific and senseless violence. Is there any hope to be found among the ruins? Will the situation continue to deteriorate and only "get worse before it gets even worse"?

Dr. Chris Taylor, Professor of Islamic Studies and currently Dean of Drew University's College of Liberal Arts, will offer his assessment of the current state of affairs in the Middle East and outline how the U.S. should approach this tragic state of affairs in the region.

Mental Health Association of Morris County Honored The First Presbyterian Church of New Vernon With Community Partner Award

On Monday, October 5th, the Mental Health Association of Morris County (MHAMC) held its 13th annual Food for Thought fundraiser, "Celebrating the Angels Among Us," at the Birchwood Manor in the Whippanny section of the township. MHAMC President and CEO Louis Schwarcz opened the evening with remarks of optimism and excitement. "Mental illness is not a reason to lose hope...we believe that one of the most powerful tools to heal is kindness," said Schwarcz. Since its existence in 1953, the MHAMC has served individuals with mental illness in the Morris County area through programs and services, education, and advocacy. Among the guests were U.S. Rep. 

A Piano Well Celebrated

The rafters rang as music filled the sanctuary on Saturday afternoon, October 10th celebrating the bountiful gift of the Church's new Steinway B piano. Min Kwon and select Young Artists of CME | Center for Musical Excellence performed a delightfully varied program to showcase this splendid instrument. Despite glorious weather that tempted one outdoors rather than in and a holiday weekend, the audience filled many of the pews and expressed their delight with enthusiastic applause after each piece and a standing ovation at the concert's conclusion.

Opening with Milhaud's amusingly titled *Le boeuf sur le toit*, the program moved into *Virtuoso Etudes on Gershwin Songs* by modern composer Earl Wild (d. 2010) played by Soyeon Park. Reed Tetzloff's fingers flew over the keyboard in his interpretation of Alfred Grunfeld's *Soirée de Vienne*; Carl Patrick Bolleia not only "tickled the ivories" but snapped his fingers, whistled, winked, and stamped his feet with a lively rendition of William Bolcom's *The Serpent's Kiss*. Malagueña and Piazzolla's toe-tapping *Libertango* (Min Kwon and Erikson Rojas) led into the concert's amusing piano finale, *Overture to The Barber of Seville*, with its almost full roster of pianists sharing the keyboard. When the high right hand was lured away by an ostensible cell phone call, the page turner took over, most adroitly! The concert concluded by introducing the faculty of the new CME Academy: Mijung Cho, on piano; Sarah Shin, flute; Sharon Cho, violin, and Patricio Molina, piano and composition. Missing from the afternoon was Ming Xie, previous concert favorite, who had to withdraw because of an injury. Commentary by Min Kwon introduced each musician, who then gave a brief description of the music to follow.

There were a lot of smiling faces to be seen and enthusiastic comments heard on yet another impressive Min-inspired concert. "Aren't we lucky!" was the phrase of the afternoon, and indeed we are. We look forward to the work of the new CME Music Academy in our midst and encourage involvement by the entire community. Thank you, Min, for saying "thank you" in such an exceptional way. We are grateful not only for the young musicians who made the instrument sing but for the donors who made this gift possible.




Pastor Nominating Committee Update

Your PNC is busy preparing a **Ministry Information Form (MIF)**, a critical first phase in the Pastor Calling process. This MIF provides a narrative picture of the mission and ministry of the congregation and its sense of call (for a full-time pastor). Through weekly meetings, the PNC is very close to completing the MIF for both Session and Presbytery review and input. The MIF will then be uploaded into a nationwide database used by prospective pastors to help them discern whether God is calling them to serve in our church.

A Brief History of Sacred Music (part two)

The church has always played a large role in supporting musicians, from J.S. Bach to Mozart to Felix Mendelssohn (who was actually Jewish, but was later baptized as a Reformed Christian) to Marty Haugen, a modern-day composer of sacred music. Without the support of the church, these composers would have had a hard time making a living! The church supplied resources, both financial and artistic, and an eager audience. These composers always had willing musicians and congregations to take part in their music, and because of this, they were able to thrive, compose often, and leave us with a legacy of sacred music.

Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750) is undeniably the most important composer in the realm of Western sacred music. Besides being one of the most prolific composers, Bach set the standard for church musicians to come. He wrote hundreds of works for sacred settings, from masses (Lutherans used the term "mass" to describe their service at his time) to cantatas, oratorios, motets, and hymns. He is possibly most well-known for his organ compositions. Bach's influence reaches further than the trained musician. His hymn-writing is considered the standard to this day, and many of our favorite hymns are composed with his "rules" of range, melody, and text in mind. Bach understood the general singing ability of church-goers, and composed accordingly.

Perhaps the reason Bach's legacy has continued to inspire musicians for hundreds of years is his motivation for composing. At the end of each piece he wrote, he inscribed *Soli Deo Gloria, "For the Glory of God, alone"*. He wrote each masterpiece with a purpose.


"The aim and final end of all music should be for none other than the glory of God, and the refreshment of the soul." –J.S. Bach


